SNAP or the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program provides low-income households with a monthly amount of cash that can only be used for groceries. The cash is provided through an EBT or LINK Card.

To qualify for SNAP, a household's total Gross Monthly Income must be 130% to 165% of the Federal Poverty Limit. The maximum gross monthly income for a household of one (not disabled or over age 60) is \$1,634. A "household" is anyone living together who regularly purchases and prepares meals together. Certain people must be considered in the same household for the purposes of SNAP, including:

- → Parents and Children up to age 22 IF they live together
- → Minors under 18-years-old living with an adult caretaker
- \rightarrow Spouses

Individuals in the same SNAP household must apply together and be on the same SNAP account.



Students enrolled at least half-time in college or vocational training are NOT eligible for SNAP benefits unless they meet one of the following exceptions:

- \rightarrow Are under 18-years-old or over 50-years-old;
- \rightarrow Work an average of 20 hours per week;
- → Participate in a state or federal work study program:
- \rightarrow Receive TANF cash assistance;
- \rightarrow Are responsible for the care of a child between 6 and 12-years-old and adequate child care is not available for school or work; OR
- \rightarrow Are enrolled full-time and is a single parent of a child under 12.



As of January 1, 2018,

low-income Illinois community college students enrolled in a Perkins- approved course of study will be eligible to apply for SNAP benefits, whether enrolled full or part-time. Perkins-approved areas of study include:

- \rightarrow Agriculture, Food & Natural Resources
- → Architecture & Construction
- → Art, Audio/Video Technology, & Communications
- → Business Management & Administration
- → Education & Training
- \rightarrow Finance
- → Government & Public Administration
- \rightarrow Health Science
- → Hospitality & Tourism
- → Human Services
- \rightarrow Information Technology
- → Law, Public Safety, Corrections & Security
- → Manufacturing
- \rightarrow Marketing
- → Science, Technology, Engineering & Math
- \rightarrow Transportation, Distribution & Logistics

If you are low-income and enrolled in one of the programs listed above in a community college, you will need to get a verification form signed by a school counselor or administrator. Verification forms can be found at
