#### **UPDATES FROM HLC**



During the 2019 site visit, concern was raised about the college's adherence to Core Component 4.B - The institution engages in ongoing assessment of student learning as part of its commitment to the educational outcomes of its students.

In the 5 years since that visit, much work has been done to create a more robust, systematic approach to course and program assessments. We now have a process that allows members of each program to set a benchmark for student performance aligned with specific course, program, and general education outcomes. Program Assessment Reports (PAR) summarize the results and allow faculty to "close the loop" with changes to teaching methods or requests for additional resources. College administrators can reference the PAR requests when budget decisions are being made.

The hard work paid off on March 4 when the site visitors reviewed our current assessment efforts and gave their official stamp of approval. Kudos to all the faculty who have been engaged in this process of improving student learning!

On April 13-16, Dr. Penny McConnell was joined by 7 members of the Assessment and Teaching/Learning teams at the annual HLC conference in Chicago. Keynote presentations focused on the civic purpose of college and the impact of technology (particularly AI) on society. During the concurrent sessions, presentations focused on a variety of topics including accreditation, teaching and learning, AI, assessment, equity in the classroom, and student success. According to Stephen Hundley, Chair of the Assessment Institute in Indianapolis, watch words for 2024 include relevance, evidence and perseverance. As we all complete our spring assessment rubrics, update our program assessment reports and plan for the next round of assessment activities, let's keep those watch words in mind and continue to focus on how we can use assessment as a tool to improve student learning.


#### <u>Assessment Spotlight -- The Accounting Program</u>


For the 2023-2024 assessment cycle, each program was given the choice to assess any of the 4 general education outcomes. Angie Springer opted to assess Critical Thinking within the Accounting program, with a focus on students' skills during their introductory class (CACC 101 - Financial Accounting).

Each of 4 exams throughout the semester included a question assessing students' ability to analyze financial data. A student would reach the Competent level if they correctly answered at least 3 of the 4 exam questions, and the benchmark was set at 80% of the students reaching a level of Competent or above.

As it turned out, of the 29 total students who were assessed, only 45% met the threshold for competency. Angie noted that there was a significant difference in performance among the students who had at least some amount of in-person instruction (55% of students in both the face-to-face and hybrid sections but only 10% of students in the fully online class reached the Competent level.

None of the sections reached the benchmark of 80% competent, so Angie is making changes to incorporate more discussion and practice problems involving critical thinking into each of her courses. She'll re-assess and evaluate whether these changes are making a positive impact on her students' critical thinking skills.



## Coming soon: LMS integration

Starting in the fall 2024 semester, faculty will be able to create assessment activities and submit their data through Blackboard/Canvas using a Watermark product called Student Learning & Licensure (SL&L). With this integration, class rosters will be automatically populated, and faculty will simply need to select the appropriate rubric and click on the rankings for each student. Quick and easy!

Official training will happen during fall inservice, but for now take a look at these preview images of the process for integrating and using SL&L
