#### Mr. David W. Harby - Chair | Term runs to 2029

Reelected to the DACC Board in April 2023, Mr. Harby is the longest-serving member at 24 years. He has recently retired as a Country Financial representative in Danville. He has served as DACC's Board Chair since 2013. Mr. Harby graduated from DACC and Illinois State University. He was a Distinguished Alumnus at DACC. For the Illinois Community College Trustees' Association, he served as president from 2010 to 2011. He has won numerous awards from the ICCTA, including the prestigious Ray Hartstein Trustee Achievement Award.



#### Mr. Greg Wolfe - Vice Chair | Term runs to 2025

Mr. Wolfe is a DACC graduate—with honors. This is his second year as vice chair to the Board. He was originally elected to the Board in 2013 and re-elected in 2019. Over the past few years, he has served as liaison to the Illinois Community College Trustees' Association and has served as a member of the ICCTA Executive Board. He formerly chaired the Trustee Education and Leadership Committee. Mr Wolfe currently chairs the ACCT Nominations committee for the Central Region. Mr. Wolfe is a senior product consultant for Watts Copy Systems. Mr. Wolfe continues to participate in a number of community service projects. He also helps boost corporate sponsor sales for the Danville Dans—a minor-league baseball team. Before his election to the DACC Board, he had served 12 years as president of the Oakwood Community Unit School District #76.



#### Ms. Tracy Cherry | Term runs to 2025

Following her retirement last year as the principal of Danville High School, in May 2024, Ms. Cherry became the principal for Danville's Schlarman Academy. For Danville District 118, she served for more than 33 years as a teacher and administrator for Danville District 118. Her experience included 11 years as the principal for the Kenneth D. Bailey Academy. Ms. Cherry was appointed to the DACC Board in September 2018 to fill the unexpired term of Tonya Hill after Ms. Hill became executive director of the DACC Foundation. The following year, Ms. Cherry was elected to a six-year term on the DACC Board. Ms. Cherry first came to Danville in 1990 as an elementary physical education teacher. Before Danville, she taught in the Kansas City, Missouri, public school system and was the first minority teacher hired by the Barstow School, a private preparatory school. As a college athlete, she was an All-American field-hockey player.



#### Ms. Sandra Finch | Term runs to 2027

Elected to the DACC Board in April 2021, Ms. Finch is the Human Relations Director for the City of Danville. Over the past seven years, she has served on DACC's Access, Equity, and Inclusion Committee, which provides community input to the College regarding its efforts to provide outreach to underrepresented groups in the community and to build greater diversity in its workforce. A Danville resident, Ms. Finch also serves on the United Way Community Investment Committee; she serves as Treasurer for the Vermilion County Unmet Needs Committee, which provides financial resources to individuals in the community whose situations do not qualify for local resources; and she is the Program Chair for the Dr. Martin Luther King Celebration Committee.



#### Mr. Dylan Haun | Term runs to 2027

Mr. Haun became a firefighter for the Danville Fire Department in 2023. He was elected to the DACC Board in 2021. A DACC graduate, in 2015-16, he served on the DACC Board as student trustee. After earning an associate degree, Mr. Haun received a bachelor in science in occupational safety from Columbia Southern University. He is currently matriculated in a master in business administration program at the University of Illinois' Gies Business School. His younger brother Logan was also a student trustee at DACC.



#### Mr. Terry Hill | Term runs to 2029

Mr. Hill is a DACC Athletics hall-of-famer and a four-time national-championship winning coach in track-and-field and a four-time "coach of the year" from 1993-96. Mr. Hill was inducted into the NJCAA National Track and Field Hall of Fame in 2005 and into the Greater Illiana Sport Hall of Fame in 2022. Mr. Hill was elected to the DACC Board in 2017 and reelected in 2023. A DACC graduate, he earned a bachelor's degree from Illinois Wesleyan and a master's degree from Eastern Illinois University. After a 30-year career as a teacher in Oakwood, he became athletic director at Danville High School, retiring in 2007.



#### Mr. Maruti Seth | Term runs to 2029

Mr. Seth was elected to the DACC Board in April 2023. He is the owner and operator of Burger King restaurants throughout Central Illinois and has been an independent business owner for more than 20 years. Born in New Delhi, India, Mr. Seth emigrated to the United States in 1988 and lived in New Jersey and Delaware before making Danville his home in 2003. While in NJ, he attended Middlesex County College followed by Kean University, earning his bachelor's degree in computer science in 1994. Mr. Seth firmly believes that community colleges can be a springboard to a better life especially for underrepresented, low-income, and nontraditional students. He has been a three-term member of the DACC Foundation board. He and his wife established an endowed scholarship for DACC students. He also serves on a number of other local boards, including the Vermilion County Workforce Innovation Board.



#### Ms. Serena Butler — Student Trustee | Term runs from April 2024 – April 2025

Ms. Serena Butler is a pre-nursing student from Danville. In addition to serving as student trustee, Ms. Butler is active on campus in Powerhouse Christian Ministry, the TRiO program, and as a work-study student. Her most memorable moment on campus so far was when she and her classmates formed a study group for Anatomy and Physiology during her first semester. As trustee, Ms. Butler will act as an advocate for both fellow students and the College. She says, "I enjoy helping others, and I believe in being a part of the difference I want to see in the world. As I gain knowledge, my aim is to aid in positive change for current and future college students. Even if I wasn't a student trustee, I would want to hear their concerns to help them continue on their journey and provide support for them however I can."

Dear Friends of DACC

When Danville High School began hosting college classes in 1946, few people believed this would mark the birth of what has become Danville Area Community College.

As tens of thousands of the men and women in the armed forces returned to Illinois following World War II, the University of Illinois established 30 extension sites throughout the State. In Vermilion County, college classes were held on afternoons and evenings at Danville High. The University hired local high-school teachers like high-school English teacher Mary Miller for the University's transfer classes.

After two years, the University saw no need to continue the program and withdrew financial support from the extension sites. Almost all of the sites closed immediately—but not the Danville center—thanks to Mary Miller. Having served as an onsite administrator for the University, Ms. Miller petitioned the Danville District 118 School Board to allow her and her fellow teachers to continue offering college classes after the University pulled out. Exercising her considerable powers of persuasion, Ms. Miller convinced the 118 Board that she would be able to offer these classes at no cost to the school district.

Under the yoke of Danville High, Ms. Miller managed the College for nearly 20 years. Then in 1965, her dream of establishing an independent community college came to fruition when the Danville Veterans Administration donated some abandoned buildings and land on East Main Street, Danville, to the College. Shortly thereafter, with a campus of its own, DACC became a fully accredited community college.

As you flip through this year's annual report, I hope you appreciate that none of what you see happening at DACC today would have been possible were it not for the patience, the vision, and the unquenchable spirit of Mary Miller. After retiring in 1972, Ms. Miller wrote a memoir, A Chance for All, a title that reflects the community-college commitment to open-door access for anyone seeking a better life through higher education.

Thank you for giving our annual report a look and for your interest in Mary Miller's miraculous community college.

After a five-year hiatus, Family Science Night was back at DACC's Mary Miller Gym on Fri., Nov. 3, 2023. Among the 50 exhibits was this one hosted by Echocariography Professor Jamie Moreland, whose program has advanced from being a certificate program to a fully transferable associate degree program.

#### **KEY ACCOMPLISHMENTS FOR 2023-24**

#### Goal

Establish a Teaching & Learning Center that offers faculty year-round support for classroom strategies and professional development.

Investigate the use of mastery learning for use in accelerated training

Increase dual-credit enrollment by introducing HyFlex classrooms to superintendents

Add certificate programs that can be 100% completed at the Hoopeston Higher Learning Center.

Improve quality and student engagement in online and hybrid classes by introducing HyFlex classes.

Address the teacher shortage among local Pre-K through 2nd grade through active participation in the State-wide ECACE grant.

Create new articulation agreements that offer more pathways to the baccalaureate for DACC students.

Strengthen management of transfer programs in the Danville Correctional Center.

#### Outcome

Under the Assistant Vice President of Liberal Arts, two faculty "champions" were enlisted to lead the TLC, initially through virtual training.

DACC is participating in a State-wide manufacturing consortium of community colleges to develop and share competency-based syllabi

DACC applied for a federal grant to fund HyFlex classrooms in 10 County high schools.


The Center is preparing for the addition of Phlebotomy and Pharmacy Tech with Corporate Education. The launch date will be in 2024.

DACC purchased and installed two HyFlex classrooms on the Danville campus and a portable HyFlex in the Hoopeston Higher Learning Center

The Fall 2023 cohort attracted more than 20 new students to the DACC early-childhood program.

While the ICCTA continues to pursue legislation to support a community-college baccalaureate, DACC has continued to bolster its relationship with Franklin University and Eastern Illinois University in 3+1 programs.

DACC appointed the director of Middle College to manage the administration of transfer programs in the DCC. In the Spring of 2024, 13 individuals earned associate degrees.





More than 300 College Express students attended the annual academic-awards ceremony on May 8, 2024. Leading the event were Director Nick Chatterton, VVEDS staff, and DACC faculty, who conferred certificates to recognize high-school students for their achievements. Danville students attended the morning ceremony in Bremer while the County schools had their ceremony in the Mary Miller Gym.

### **KEY ACCOMPLISHMENTS FOR 2023-24**

#### Goal

Address local need for degrees and certificates in high-demand jobs.

Develop transferable associate-degree programs in high-demand fields.

Respond to College Express requests for additional program offerings for students.

Rebrand ICAP's as the "Elevate" program by bringing new certification programs to run concurrently with high-school equivalency.

Increase enrollment in career programs at the Danville Correctional Center.

#### Outcome

In an alliance with WorkSource—and funded through a Wheeler Foundation grant for training in professions that serve the disabled community—the College developed a Direct Service Professional certificate program. DSP workers serve people with disabilities.

Developed and received accreditation for associate degrees in sonography and echocardiography. In addition, the speech-language pathology assistant degree program has undergone full vetting and will be introduced in the Spring of 2025; restaurant management (without a hospitality program) is in development; through the Carle Healthcare grant, the behavioral-sciences professor has developed a mental-health therapist associate.

DACC's recently revamped HVAC program resulted in full classes during the morning and afternoon sessions.

The Fall class graduated six students with certifications in health-information technology/public billing.

In spring 2024, 20 students graduated from DACC's four careerand-technical programs. The College's new three-year contract with the Illinois Department of Corrections includes a fifth career program, which is in manufacturing.








**DACC's Faculty-to-Student Ratio** 



The number of bachelor's degree programs that DACC students have available locally and affordably thanks to DACC's 3 + 1 partnerships with Franklin University, Iowa Wesleyan University, and Eastern Illinois University. Students earn a bachelor's degree by completing a DACC associate degree and then an additional year of DACC classes.

The remaining 30 credits are through online classes.



DACC installed eight new HyFlex classrooms on the Danville Campus and a portable one in the Hoopeston Higher Learning Center. The multi-media, fully interactive technology offers better interaction among online students, in-class students, and their instructor. In the Fall of 2023, Adult Education partnered with DACC's Healthcare Information Technology Department to combine the pursuit of a diploma with a certificate in Healthcare Billing Management. The program, which is called Elevate, offers students a tuition-free pathway to earning their high-school diploma while simultaneously studying to earn credentials in a well-paying career.

#### **KEY ACCOMPLISHMENTS FOR 2023-24**

#### Goal

Address worker shortages at all local manufacturing, retail, transportation/logistics, and specialized industries throughout the region.

Develop fully online programs to expand the DACC enrollment base. Market CCMSI claims examiner nationally. Introduce Health Information Technology's cancer-registry certificate

#### Outcome

After a delay due to significant managerial turnover at the Danville Casino, the new leaders of the Golden Nugget met with representatives from the American Job Center, Corporate Education, and the DACC Foundation to develop a plan to increase the workforce.

Successfully marketed the CCMSI claims examiner program nationally; developed a second fully online certificate—cancer registry— as a stackable credential for the health-information technology program.

### **KEY ACCOMPLISHMENTS FOR 2023-24**

#### Goal

Progress toward the 2025 goal of a 45-percent graduation rate by closely tracking the progress of students in the Fall 2021 and Fall 2022 cohort of first-time students via Customer Relationship Manager.

Improve the success rate in developmental math by offering a basic-skills class concurrently (or as a corequisite) with a credit-bearing math class.

Develop and implement a structured plan for Iconic members and veterans that includes a small learning community with weekly engagement from TRIO Director and Academic Advisors to review academic progress.

Examine the DACC experience from the perspective of new and returning students—and then repair any disconnects.

Develop the "Back to School Block Party" as an event for both DACC students/staff/ faculty AND local, underrepresented groups—to raise awareness of DACC's culture of inclusion.

#### Outcome

Through CRM, Counseling has worked closely with students in the Fall 2021 cohort. As a result, the College achieved the all-time DACC record graduation rate of 45 percent one year ahead of the goal.


For the Math 107 corequisite course, the retention rate was a stellar 83.3%.

Iconic membership increased to 17 in 2023-24. Nine Iconic members graduated in Spring 2024 while the remaining eight are still enrolled.

The College developed a schematic used in student-services training to identify the pathways and pitfalls students may encounter from the time they apply to their graduation.

Student Services hosted DACC's first Block Party on Aug. 16, 2023, with over 200 community members attending.

#### Student Race & Ethnicity





Led by Coach Guido Esteves, the DACC eSports team has become a member of the Western Conference of the NJCAAe. The region consists of nearly 100 community colleges in the Central, Rocky Mountain, and Pacific time zones.



During DACC's Fall "Spirit Week" festivities, students engaged in fun activities throughout the Campus, including board games in the Library. Library Staff Kathy Hantz and Jennifer Seda organized the Library games for students like Madison Wells, Alison Wilson, and Josephine Kamwela.



This year, DACCs three-year graduation rate for the cohort that enrolled full-time in 2021 has officially surpassed 45 percent. That's three points higher than the previous record and more than double the national average for community colleges.

### **KEY ACCOMPLISHMENTS FOR 2023-24**

#### Goal

Encourage students to graduate on-time by registering as full-time students

In partnership with the VP of Operations, the Branding Team evolved into the Marketing Consortium in Fall 2023. The team consists of VP of Operations, AVPs of Operations, Ex. Director of College Relations, Recruitment & Engagement Coordinator, Creative Content Coordinator. eSports & Community Engagement Coordinator, and Online Support & Web Technician. The team meets weekly with the first meeting of the month open to anyone on campus.

Provide assistance to job seekers as well as local and regional businesses

Build a Strategic Enrollment Management plan based on input from a wide range of stakeholders.

#### Outcome

DACC introduced the "Provost's Promise" program in Spring 2024 to offer a free DACC education for students who meet a number of requirements, including early, full-time registration and the maintaining of a 2.5 or better GPA. More than 50 students joined the first cohort.

Creative services made CTE videos which highlighted the marquee programs on social media. Images from major CTE programs were featured in each semester's print and video enrollment advertising. Paid social media campaign was conducted for the new Sono/Echo Associate degree programs. Both programs – and Rad Tech – were able to fill their classes for summer. A Google Ads campaign was conducted for both the Cancer Registry and online HIT programs. This campaign was national.

The April 2024 closing of the Quaker Oats plant in Danville required the AJC partners—and especially VCW—to perform a "Rapid Response" by taking a teamwork approach in addressing the needs of the 514 former employees.

Based on a disaggregation of survey data and a SWOT analysis involving DACC employees, Board members, students, and community members, the College has identified key concepts and guiding principles for the Strategic Enrollment Management plan.



The College welcomed 32 new nursing graduates to the profession in 2023-24, with 16 graduating in December and another 16 in May.




The Iconic program offers personal and scholastic support for African American and other underrepresented male students.






### **KEY ACCOMPLISHMENTS FOR 2023-24**

#### Goal

Increase student access to financial aid by updating service systems in place; also improve student retention/completion of financial aid recipients.

Increase the functionality of myDACC to encourage greater student use of the portal.

Address the need for access to mental-health services by providing on campus therapeutic/mental health support for students, faculty and staff, at no cost.

Provide support for students whose low socio-economic conditions are an obstacle to their educational success.

Attract local athletes by restoring volleyball as an intercollegiate sport.

Expand the area for the eSports lab and make eSports area more visible to students.

Encourage increased student use of the Library for studying, relaxation, and recreational purposes.

#### Outcome

Utilized Customer Relationship Manager to communicate more frequently and effectively with students; also has used CRM to track Financial Aid "details," such as SAP status, Pell Eligibility Used, Loan status, etc.

Promoted myDACC by informing students that this is the "one-stop shop" for all of their services at the College, including class schedules, bursar services, and all communications.

A full-time Counselor/Advisor was hired. Two full-time employees remain available in Advisement & Counseling to triage students and help with mental-health needs.

While only four students in 2023-24 self-identified as "homeless," DACC counseling has received training to show that the number is vastly underreported. There are several students who are itinerant without considering this to be a homeless condition.

The Athletic Department prepared to launch the inaugural season in Fall 2024 with a competitive team with a full schedule and roster.

A new location has been designated for the eSports lab – in the lower level of Clock Tower. This is a larger area and more visible to students.

Library staff have adopted an open-door policy that literally leaves the door open. Mounted over the door is the word, "Welcome." Staff has introduced innovative activities like "game day" and other contests to attract students.

Renovate Hegeler Hall for beneficial use by summer 2024.

Improve the sound quality in the Mary Miller Gym to benefit institutional activities like Commencement, Nurses' Pinning, and the Foundation's Honors Program.

Upgrade students' extracurricular facilities.

Upgrade outdated campus maps and signage

Address deterioration of the current on-campus training ground for CDL/tractor trailer.

Replace the outdated digital phone system with an Internet-based system.

#### Outcome

New keyless entries were installed on exterior doors of all buildings. Entry fobs were distributed to all employees. All camera systems were upgraded and enhanced to enable Security to have real-time video surveillance

Construction was managed on schedule and within budget to achieve beneficial use prior to the start of the Fall semester.

A sound engineer developed a plan that DACC implemented to install 15 new ceiling speakers, new microphones, sound panels, and a digital processor to manage the sound system.

The golf team began renting an area at a local sports complex for the golf simulator; the softball team began leasing Winter Park fields; the weight-room upgrade is complete.

Replaced campus map near the Danville Campus's main entrance with updated building information. Replaced all exterior campus-wide wayfinding signage.

With increased demand for CDL training, the training area on the Danville Campus expanded across much of the front parking lot on East Main Street. This will enable the College to reseal that area that had deteriorated after years of use.

Installation was completed in the Fall of 2023.



For the second time since 1978, DACC hosted the Vermilion County schools' annual basketball and cheerleading tournament in the Mary Miller Gym during the week of Jan. 12, 2024. The College invested \$130,000 to upgrade the Gym's sound system in advance of the tournament.

#### Outcome

Purchased and in March 2024 installed an improved and more reliable system for Foundation operations in Blackbaud's Raiser's Edge. Foundation staff immediately began using Raiser's Edge for keeping donor records. What's important, too, is that the migration to the new system didn't deter the Foundation from once again (and for the third-straight year) awarding scholarships to every student who applied for assistance. In 2023, the Foundation awarded 716 scholarships that totaled more than \$1 million.

Created an online application for international students.

In June, the College introduced computer timekeeping that relies on email and SharePoint for submitting, reviewing, and approving attendance. Along with greater efficiency, the new system drastically reduces the College's use of paper.

After several months of Collegewide vetting, the faculty and administration chose Canvas as the ideal learning-management system.

For each office area, the College installed new printers that simplify scanning and emailing documents.


After several months of research, the College has solicited vendors for building and maintaining a solar farm in the field that abuts East Main Street. In allowing an energy contractor to build a solar farm on DACC property, the College would receive significant reductions in energy cost.

Using PHS funds/bonds, DACC replaced the roof of the Tech Center; Clock Tower/ Horticulture renovation was funded through College funds and State Capital Development Board funds.

Launched "Tell it to the President" during finals week of the Fall semester and again in April during the Spring semester. Each of five location-specific sessions encouraged open and frank dialogue between the president and rank-and-file employees. Also, the Cabinet hosted an "Employee Appreciation Breakfast" for all employees in the fall and spring, as well as a barbecue in the summer of 2023. One other initiative that Human Resources launched was "Employee Spotlight," featuring a profile of a different employee each month.

In Fall 2023, Human Resources began hosting monthly "Inside Track @DACC" workshops that are geared for new employees throughout their first year. A number of incumbent employees have also attended these sessions.

#### Goal

Increase outreach efforts to people from underrepresented groups to pursue key positions at the College.

Implement a "growth by substitution" model that eliminates nugatory functions and reinvests resources into growth areas.

#### Outcome

Human Resources and the chief diversity officer have adopted a new procedure for reviewing applications to ensure that qualified people from underrepresented groups receive interviews.

Finance Department and president's office have challenged the Cabinet and support groups to reduce or eliminate programs that provide a low return on investment.

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### ORGANIZATIONAL ADVANCEMENT





For the first time in five years, theater returned to the Bremer Center for a student-and-community-partnered performance of *To Kill a Mockingbird*. The play drew a large audience during the weekend of Oct. 20-22, 2023, and was widely acclaimed as a quality production. Angie Bergman of the Adult Education Department has exhibited her considerable talents as a producer and director to bring theater back to DACC.

#### **KEY ACCOMPLISHMENTS FOR 2023-24**

#### Goal

Create and manage a more accessible online catalog of programs and student services

Through collaboration with stakeholders (employees, trustees, students, community members), develop longrange, data-driven strategic plans for academic affairs and student services.

Create an endowed fund with a corpus of \$1.8 m, to generate enough interest income to pay the tuition for up-to 20 first-year and 20 second-year presidential scholars.

Through the Bremer Gallery display, the Foundation will increase recognition and participation in the program to encourage people to make a bequest to the College for scholarships.

Provide in-house dining services ("The Jaguar Café") in the DACC student union that includes hot and affordable food choices as well as healthy options. Profitability during the first year is desired but not mandatory.

#### Outcome

Using the Watermark program, the provost built an online catalog as well as templates for assessment—thereby meeting the self-imposed June 1 deadline.

Per the recommendation of the HLC, the College is hiring a strategic planner/institutional effectiveness director.

The Foundation's strategy of recognizing donors and aligning them with "presidential scholar" students is paying off. The combined funds—Frank Brittingham and "Presidential Scholarship"—has a corpus of over \$1.8 m, thereby yielding \$90,000 annually, in perpetuity. This rate would pay for the tuition of even the maximum number of presidential scholars.

Although the donor information regarding amounts is confidential, the Foundation added 14 new names to the roll of Mary Miller donors in FY 24—thereby increasing the total number of these donors by 14 percent.

Though the service cost DACC nearly \$50,000 in FY 2024, some of the loss was offset by the College's requirement that the Jaguar Café have the right of first refusal for all catering at the College. As a result, the dining-services staff catered 23 events during the year.



The College's first-ever town-wide Block Party took place on Aug. 16, 2023, and drew more than 250 local residents with their families to the Danville Campus to enjoy bouncing around in inflatables, games for prizes, and food-food-food. The event was led by Recruitment and Student Engagement Coordinator Alexis Simmons, Recruitment Assistant Victoria Boothe and dozens of volunteers as well as building-services and maintenance employees.



The College held a May 13 ceremony in the Tech Center to honor the 21 students who graduated from the year-long, pre-apprenticeship construction program funded through Illinois WorkNet. Students receive free training and financial support based on their socioeconomic status. Professor Doug Hunter was the lead instructor with support from Administrative Specialist Natasha Meranoli-Pounds. Operations Vice President Kerri Thurman manages the grant. The program funded an additional 12 students in the spring and will support 25 more job-seekers in the Fall of 2024.



The National Junior College Athletic Association knows a great host when it sees one. On Feb. 7, 2024, the NJCAA announced that their Board of Regents approved a three-year extension for DACC to host the men's division II basketball tournament. Following the two-year extension that the NJCAA granted in 2023, DACC's 31-year run will continue at least through the 2028 tournament.

Provide more effective marketing, branding, advertising, corporate communications, events management, and recruitment activities through an integrated marketing system.

Focus on the boost in apprenticeship funding to provide increased support for local industry. Integrate DACC's career services with the American Job Center and Vermilion County Works. Produce the annual "Great Careers in the Danville Area" guide for distribution to students and job seekers.

#### Outcome

With the community-garden construction completed during the spring of 2023, DACC's primary focus has been on developing and launching a new associate of applied science in mental-health therapy. DACC's professor of behavioral science has built the curriculum, which required two new courses.

Under the vice president of operations, the marketing consortium has begun meeting each week and collaborating on all marketing materials, including videos, social-media posts, and television broadcasts. One of the marquee events was the unveiling of a Danville City bus that is thoroughly wrapped with engaging DACC promotional images. The group also produced a branding guide and assisted in the wrap of a DACC tractor trailer.

The Illinois WorkNet pre-apprenticeship program graduated 7 students in the Fall and 21 in the Spring to support local industry. However, the year's greatest impact came with the surprise closing of Danville's Quaker Oats plant and the dislocation of 514 employees. The plant shutdown brought the American Job Center and Vermilion County Works into the public spotlight for their "rapid response" case management that included job placement to other local industry, job training, assistance with health benefits and retirement, and other support.

#### **KEY ACCOMPLISHMENTS FOR 2023-24**

#### Goal

Per State law, establish a localefficiency committee consisting of Board members and two external community members. The charge is to examine a College operation that could be improved. The Committee needs to hold at least three public meetings within 18 and then file a report to the State.

Recruit highly energetic students to participate in marketing and publicawareness campaigns as members of the All-Star DACC Jaguars.

Meet or exceed the institutional goal of awarding 10 percent of the overall expenditures to BEP companies.

Meet or exceed all requirements among the HLC's five criteria and 23 core components.

#### Outcome

Along with selecting the prescribed committee members, the first order of business was to select a topic of interest and then request further information. The Committee asked DACC to provide information on the College's programs to support the mental health of students and employees. The vice president of human resources provided this in advance of the second meeting.

During FY 2024, the 15 All-Star Jaguars participated in a number of major events, including Governor Pritzker's Oct. 4 visit to the College and the Nov. 3 return of Family Science Night. They produced many promotional videos and are memorialized on hallway banners that will be on display in the coming year.

In FY 2024, DACC increased BEP spending. Of note, a BEP vendor is the architect for the \$240,000 Hegeler project and another BEP vendor was awarded the \$800,000 door lock/camera project. Our list of noncertified BEP continues to grows, but that does not help us meet our goals.

The quality of the 100-page assurance argument and the College's preparedness for the visit by the five-member HLC team produced welcome approval from the Commission. The only source of concern was the College's lack of a long-range planner and unit dedicated to institutional effectiveness.



The Higher Learning Commission's visiting team issued its final report from the midcycle review of Mar. 4 and 5. Although the HLC would still like to see DACC continue to fine tune its strategic-planning process, in all the major areas of institutional performance—especially in our teaching and learning—DACC passed with flying colors. One of the highlights from the Higher Learning Commission's visiting team's accreditation visit on Mar. 4 and 5 was when Microbiology Distinguished Professor Wendy Brown introduced the HLC Chair Dr. William Brownsberger to her homegrown boa constrictor, Junior.



Community Education's "College for Kids" program attracts hundreds of children to the College each summer in activities that include sports camps, eSports, welding, Minecraft, sports media, Lego robotics, music mania, and art studio. The summer programs culminate with "First Gig Rock Camp"—a week-long phenomenon during which children learn to play a guitar or drums or sing rock songs well enough to perform before a live audience.



On Mar. 23, 2024, Corporate and Community Education sponsored an Easter Egg Hunt for the community. Thanks to the supervision by several volunteers, more than 300 future DACC students participated in the second-annual event in the Quad.

#### Outcome

The NJCAA men's national basketball tournament, now in its 31st year at DACC, continues to engender the most buzz throughout the region. However, DACC has also attracted a great deal of acclaim in becoming the annual host for the County schools' boys' and girls' basketball tournaments, the cheerleading tournament, and the volleyball tournament. In addition, the 2024 hosting of the 21 high schools for the eSports regionals attracted more than 200 students to the College. Aside from athletics, DACC's "Jaguar Players" formed alliances with local community theater to produce two first-rate plays in the Bremer Theater-"To Kill a Mockingbird" in the Fall and "Bye-Bye Birdie" in the Spring.

The \$4.4 million renovation of Clock Tower building and Ornamental Horticulture Center will focus on getting both educational facilities into a state-of-good repair. Plumbing, electrical, bathroom, and HVAC upgrades are the priorities in the scope of work. Beneficial use of both buildings is scheduled for October 2024.

### HOW THE HOOPESTON HIGHER LEARNING CENTER CAME TO BE

The idea for the Hoopeston Higher Learning Center surfaced in 2008 when DACC President Alice Marie Jacobs met with Hoopeston leaders who told her they were interested in a satellite DACC location. By 2009, DACC's Board of Trustees' pledged their support. The Carle Hoopeston Regional Health Center donated the 4,900-square-foot building to the College. From 2012-13, the College renovated in the facility. Work included the construction of five classrooms and a student commons.

Funding the new Center came from a variety of sources, including \$206,000 from the Hoopeston Area Healthcare Foundation and \$30,000 from the Hoopeston City Council.

Classes began in September 2013 at the renovated facility, which is located at 847 E. Orange St.

Bill Nicholls, a community leader in Hoopeston, broached the idea of the portrait when he was a member of the DACC Foundation Board. "Dr. Jacobs has done so much good for Hoopeston with the development of the center. Having her picture displayed inside is a fitting way to pay tribute to her contributions."



### **DACC HISTORY**



The Danville Campus, circa 1965, when the Veterans Administration offered seven buildings and 75 acres that enabled the College to leave Danville High School and have a campus of its own.

May 13, 1946: Mary Miller founds DACC as an extension center of the University of Illinois in 1946.

August 22, 1949: DACC becomes a public junior college under Danville Public Schools.

September 30, 1951: The College receives the name Danville Junior College.

Jan. 11, 1964: The Danville Area Community College Foundation is formed as a nonprofit 501 (c) 3 to fund a College campus.

August 1, 1965: The College acquires seven historic buildings from the Veterans Administration on East Main Street, moving to its current 75-acre campus.

September 12, 1965: The Danville Junior College Foundation launches a fundraising drive to support the move to the new campus.

April 11, 1966: DACC becomes an independent two-year area college with the election of its first Board of Trustees and the establishment of District 507.

May 17, 1969: Dedication of the Ornamental Horticulture Center.

April 30, 1970: Opening of the Mary Miller Center and Gymnasium.

July 1, 1972: Dr. William Langas becomes DACC's second president, replacing founding President Mary Miller after her 26-year tenure. July 9, 1972: Completion of the Technology Center, which includes the South Bay, Weld Shop, Machine Shop, and offices.

June 15, 1979: Dr. Joseph Borgen becomes DACC's third president.

Sept. 1, 1979: The name Danville Junior College is changed to Danville Area Community College to be more reflective of the services rendered as a comprehensive community college.

Sept. 3, 1981: Dr. Ronald Lingle becomes DACC's fourth president.

June 1, 1982: Renovation of the Bremer Theater and construction of conference rooms.

Sept. 10, 1982: Renovation of the Clock Tower building.

Feb. 14, 1987: Completion of the expansion of the Mary Miller Center's first and second floor for Math and Science education.

July 1, 1989: Dr. Harry Braun is named DACC's fifth president.

Sept. 3, 1992: Expansion of the Technology Center and dedication in the name of former DACC President Harry Braun to open classrooms and offices on the north and west wings.

Mar. 16, 1994: DACC hosts the first of what will be 24 consecutive years (including this year) as host of the NJCAA Division II national men's basketball tournament.

Aug. 18, 1997: Dedication of the Child Development Center.

June 11, 1997: The TRIO program begins at DACC. TRIO Student Support Services is a federally funded program offered by the United States Department of Education and is a part of a network of over 2,800 TRIO programs serving nearly 850,000 students throughout the country.

July 1, 1998: The Bremer Theater renovation is completed.

Dec. 15, 1998: Job Training Partnership/Vermilion County Works moves to new location at 407 N. Franklin Street.

Sept. 1, 1999: Dr. Alice Marie Jacobs becomes DACC's sixth president.

Nov. 1, 1999: Opening of Lincoln Hall.

May 17, 2000: Remodeling completed for the first floor and basement of the Clock Tower Library.

Apr. 1, 2001: Remodeling of the art and painting rooms in the Clock Tower building.

Oct. 24, 2002: Completion of \$30 million in renovations to Cannon, Prairie, and Vermilion halls.

Sept. 30, 2004: Dedication of the First National Bank Collection of Public Art in the Clock Tower Center.

Sept. 10, 2005: Community Education begins holding classes in a store at the Village Mall.

July 15, 2007: DACC becomes an Achieving the Dream College, joining more than 200 other community colleges in a nation-wide initiative that Lumina Foundation and seven founding partner organizations launched in 2004.

Nov. 7, 2007: Dedication of the Bremer Conference and Workforce Development Center.

July 31, 2009: Demolition work completion on buildings 5, 9 and 10 as well as underground tunnels.

Oct. 10, 2009: Julius W. Hegeler Garden Gateway is dedicated.

Mar. 29, 2011: Opening of the Julius W. Hegeler II Greenhouse.

July 11, 2011: Construction of the Wind Turbine Training Tower, which is located on farm ground.

Oct. 24, 2012: Completion of Mary Miller Complex renovation and the naming of the William B. Black Health professions Center.

Sept. 16, 2013: Opening of the Hoopeston Higher Learning Center: first day of classes.

Dec. 10, 2014: Dedication ceremony to open the Julius W. Hegeler II Advanced Technology Center.

Aug. 15, 2016: Dr. Stephen Nacco becomes DACC's seventh president, replacing Dr. Alice Marie Jacobs, who retires on Aug. 30 after 17 years as DACC's president.

Nov. 1, 2016: DACC dedicates the Bobette Steely Hegeler Memorial Bench in front of the Clock Tower.

Feb. 15, 2017: DACC opens a classroom in the center of Fair Oaks, a series of projects that the Housing Authority manages. The classroom has been outfitted with technology sufficient to accommodate up to 15 students.

July 1, 2017: DACC becomes one of the nation's few community colleges to become a regional one-stop operator for a federally mandated American Job Center.

Aug. 31, 2017: After receiving an official notice of transferring the former Carnegie Library from the Veterans Administration to DACC, the Board of Trustees holds a ceremony to dedicate the building in the name of Dr. Alice Marie Jacobs. A \$2 million bequest from philanthropist Julius W. Hegeler II will fund the renovation of Jacobs Hall.

Aug. 25, 2018: The College hosts its first annual "Farm to Fork" dinner to raise money to support the Sustainability Far, a hands-on agricultural learning lab for students that the Foundation's Kristy Herr and her husband Jerry Bartos have provided for College use.

Oct. 25, 2018: The DACC Board approves the creation of the College's first-ever women's golf team and restores men's golf, which had been discontinued since 2013

May 5, 2019: The installation of HVAC units on the roof of the Mary Miller Gym completes a \$600,000 capital project that results in bringing air conditioning to the Gym.



### DACC HISTORY

Aug. 19, 2019: DACC begins offering night classes in English, math, sociology, and high-school preparation at Georgetown-Ridge Farm High School.

Nov. 7, 2019: The Board of the Higher Learning Commission reaffirms the reaccreditation of DACC through 2029. The Standard Pathways will require a comprehensive visit on the fourth year, 2023.

March 30, 2020: Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the College ends all classroom instruction and delivers all courses exclusively online for the remainder of the spring semester.

June 30, 2020: The College receives the deed to the U.S. Army Reserve upon completing a \$150,000 purchase of the two building, 3.5-acre property located on the northeast corner of the Danville Campus.

May 15, 2021: Under the direction of Facilities Executive Director Doug Adams, DACC completed the \$2 million renovation of Jacobs Hall—on time and within budget.

June 25, 2021: Dedication of Hegeler Hall in honor of Julius W. Hegeler II, whose Foundation pledged \$3 million over three years to fund the renovation of the former U.S. Army Reserve to become DACC's new home for corporate and community education.

Feb. 12, 2022: DACC paid tribute to the College's first two African-American athletes during a special presentation at the Mary Miller Gym: Robert Williams and Clifford Dupree.


Jan. 13, 2023: Facilities workers team up with Athletics and Broadcast staff to open a media suite overlooking the Mary Miller Gym. The new booth is completed in time for the Jan. 13-21 basketball tournament for Vermilion County schools.

Jan. 24, 2023: DACC begins providing mechatronics and manufacturing training for inmates at the Danville Correctional Center—the first community college in Illinois to provide this training at a State correctional facility.

Aug. 17, 2023: Vice President Dr. Carl Bridges becomes DACC's first-ever provost. As such, he is responsible for also managing both academics and student services at the College.

Mar. 15, 2024: Dr. Bridges merges the Liberal Arts & Library Division with the Math, Science, and Health Professions Division to form the Arts & Sciences Division. The merger will offer more efficient class-schedule coordination for students transferring to baccalaureate-degree institutions. Dr. Michael Hepner becomes the new division's first dean.

June 27, 2024: Application deadline for the first-ever cohort for the "Provost's Promise" a program that guarantees an all-expenses-paid DACC education for students who pledge to graduate ontime with a B or better average. More than 50 students participate in the first cohort. During DACC's May 17
