DISTRICT

Danville Area Community College (DACC) is part of Community College District 507. Our district serves high school areas across five counties: Vermilion, Edgar, Iroquois, Ford, and Champaign. Located in Danville, Illinois, the campus is conveniently situated 125 miles south of Chicago, 35 miles east of Champaign-Urbana, and 90 miles west of Indianapolis.

STUDENT LIFE

Students have many opportunities to get involved on campus, through personal interest clubs, academic organizations, athletic teams, employment, and more. Students are able to join existing clubs and organizations, or they can form new ones.



FINANCIAL AID

Financial assistance is available in the form of scholarships, grants, loans and part-time employment. More than half of the student body receives some type of financial aid each year.

ONLINE DEGREES & ACCREDITATION

DACC offers more than 100 online courses in Transfer, Career, and Basic Skills programs. The Higher Learning Commission has granted DACC approval to offer online degrees and certificates.

EARLY COLLEGE

Eligible students may earn college credit while still enrolled in high school. DACC offers many early college opportunities, both on campus and in area high schools. In addition to traditional early college credit. The College offers 16 College Express career programs to area students as well as a Middle College for juniors-seniors at risk of not graduating from high school.



AREAS OF STUDY

DACC offers transfer degrees in Associate in Arts, Associate in Sciences, Associate in Engineering Sciences, Associate in Fine Arts, Associate in Fine Arts Education, Associate in Fine Arts in Music Performance, and Associate in Fine Arts in Music Education. Students can earn Associate in Applied Science degrees (AAS) in any of more than 20 two-year career programs; or those looking for a more general, non-transferable degree may pursue the Associate of General Studies (AGS) degree. There are also more than 30 certificates to provide entry-level skills in these same career programs. Nursing students can enter a ladder program and become a Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA), Licensed Practical Nurse (LPN), or Registered Nurse (RN) with an Associate Degree in Nursing (ADN).

The Danville Area Community College Foundation is a nonprofit corporation organized and operated to promote and support Danville Area Community College through fundraising efforts and stewardship.



TUITION RATES

The in-district tuition rate at DACC for the 2026-2027 school year is \$165 per credit hour. An additional \$40 per credit hour is charged as a technology and activity fee. At this rate, the average full-time student taking 15 credit hours would pay \$3,075.00 per semester, or \$6,150.00 per year. Additional fees and book costs vary based on courses chosen.

FACULTY

Full-time faculty members teach approximately 87% of our courses, with the remainder taught by highly qualified part-time instructors who are experts in their fields. Additionally, 75.8% of DACC's full-time faculty hold a Master's degree or higher. Faculty ensures individualized attention to student needs through small class sizes, which average just 17 students per class.

Operating with a \$21.54 million budget, the DACC serves as the premier economic and civic anchor for Vermilion County and surrounding communities, driving an estimated \$115 million to \$130 million in total annual economic activity. By equipping 3,500 students and workforce participants with high-demand credentials annually, alongside providing specialized training and event programming to over 6,000 community members, the college acts as the region's central hub for talent, culture, and business engagement. This dual-impact ecosystem effectively creates and sustains roughly 1,500 to 1,900 regional jobs by directly fueling local business supply chains and solving critical workforce shortages in manufacturing, healthcare, and logistics. Ultimately, every dollar invested in the district serves as a catalyst for capital retention, mitigating skill gaps and ensuring Vermilion County and its surrounding communities maintain a highly competitive edge for new corporate investment.

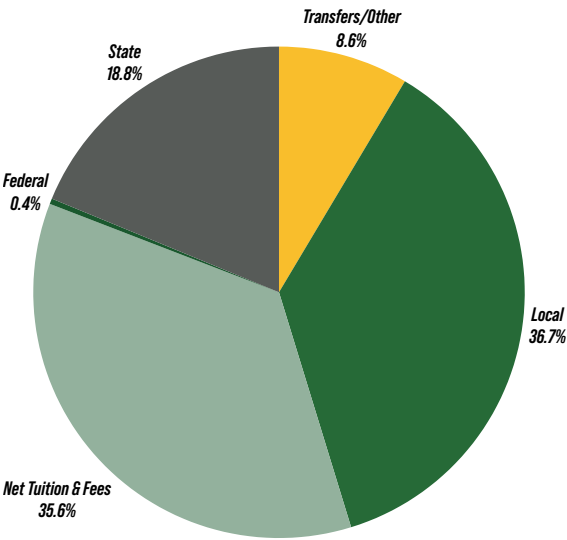
